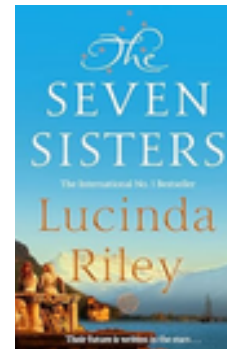
The Thursday Murder Club investigates a friend's murder and a missing package, uncovering a web of crime and confronting personal loss as they hunt the "last devil to die."



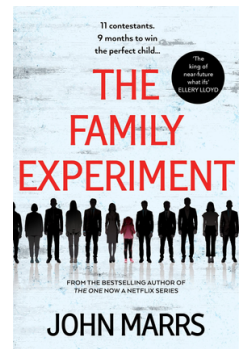
