

Humanities is central to learners becoming ethical, informed citizens of Wales and the world. Learners will investigate their heritage and develop a sense of place. Learners will contemplate different perspectives as they develop an understanding of the ethnic and cultural diversity within Wales.

As our learners explore their locality and Wales, as well as the wider world, they will establish a solid base of knowledge and understanding of geographical, historical, religious, non-religious, business and social studies concepts. These experiences, in and outside the classroom, will help them become ambitious, capable learners, ready to learn throughout their lives.

At Key Stage 3, the Humanities Area encompasses Geography; History and Religion, Values and Ethics. Within these subjects, pupils will also investigate the social issues in society today as well as the factors that shape the Welsh and global economies. These subjects share many common themes, concepts and transferable skills that will be useful for all Areas across the curriculum. We strive to deliver engaging and innovative lessons that make full use of our one-to-one technology. HISTORY AND POLITICS

By studying History at St Cyres School our pupils will gain an understanding and respect for their own and each other's different cultures, stories and traditions. Pupils will study topics throughout time at local, national and global national level. By studying History at all three levels pupils will discover their heritage and develop a sense of place and cynefin in Wales. From investigating the 12th century mediaeval village at Cosmeston to analysing 21st century methods of police investigation used throughout the UK, our pupils will be exposed to a wide variety of topics in order to gain an understanding of how their past has shaped our world today.

The study of History provides pupils with a wide range of transferable skills, including the ability to gather, analyse and evaluate historical sources of evidence. Through these sources, pupils will investigate different interpretations of key historical events and be encouraged to draw their own conclusions. Pupils will learn how to present and justify their findings to peers and teachers through a wide variety of digital literacy techniques embedded in our department's curriculum.

RELIGION, VALUES AND ETHICS

RVE is a statutory subject of the school curriculum. RVE at St Cyres contributes dynamically to pupils' education provoking challenging questions about meaning and purpose in life, beliefs about God, ultimate reality, issues of right and wrong and what it means to be human. In RVE pupils learn about and from religions and worldviews in local, national and global contexts, to discover, explore and consider different answers to these questions. They learn to weigh up the value of wisdom from different sources, to develop and express their insights in response, and to agree or disagree respectfully.

RVE equips pupils with systematic knowledge and understanding of a range of religious and worldviews, enabling them to develop their ideas, values and identities. We aim to develop in pupils an aptitude for dialogue so that they can participate positively in society with its diverse religions and worldviews. Pupils will gain and deploy the skills needed to understand, interpret and evaluate texts, sources of wisdom and authority and other evidence.

Pupils learn to articulate clearly and coherently their personal beliefs, ideas, values and experiences while respecting the right of others to differ. Alongside the subject's contribution to pupils' mental, cognitive and linguistic development, RVE offers distinctive opportunities to promote pupils' spiritual, moral, social and cultural development. RVE lessons offer a structured and safe space for reflection, discussion, dialogue and debate.

SOCIOLOGY, PSYCHOLOGY AND CRIMINOLOGY

The study of Social Sciences, which includes Sociology, Criminology and Psychology, enables pupils to develop an understanding of the complex, pluralistic and diverse nature of societies, past and present. It encourages an appreciation of identity, heritage and cynefin, influencing learners and helping to build their sense of self and of belonging. Through an understanding of themselves, learners develop their own identity and an awareness of how they, as individuals, can shape the communities in which they live. Consequently, learners will come to realise that the choices we all make, individually and collectively, can have major impacts on society.

Studying the Social Sciences can encourage a critical understanding of how societies are and have been organised, structured and led, in the learners' own locality and in Wales, as well as in the wider world. Further engagement will also encourage them to explore – and develop a tolerant and empathetic understanding of – the varied beliefs, values, traditions and ethics that underpin and shape human society. Learners become ethically informed citizens who are knowledgeable about their culture, community, society and the world, and respect the needs and rights of others, as members of a diverse society.
